6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

End Semester examinations conducted by the University and Continuous Evaluation by the college are conducted smoothly. All departments conduct internal examinations and class tests. The examined papers are shown to the students and the parents are informed about the progress of the students in the Parent-Teacher-Student meetings. Internal marks are allotted based on the test marks and the student's attendance percentage. Theory and practical examinations consists of two components, namely, external evaluation for 80% marks and internal evaluation for 20% marks. The results of internal assessment examinations are uploaded online to the University. The external examinations are conducted by the University directly and the results are published. The UG and PG Practical examinations are conducted by the external examiners at the college.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- The Research Committee and the IQAC is functional in the institution to promote research related activities of Faculties and students.


ANALYSIS OF STUDENTS FEEDBACK

At the end of each semester, feedback from students was used to evaluate teacher's performance. For this purpose a questionnaire comprising 10 questions were distributed among the students. In the evaluation process parameters such as subject competency, communication skill, teaching skill, sincerity and commitment, approach to students, participation in extracurricular activities etc. were included. Teachers were rated on a 5 point scale, 0 indicated *very poor* and 4 indicated *excellent*. The completely filled feedback from students were collected and subjected to a detailed analysis. The IQAC team collected and analyzed the survey reports from all the departments. The results were expressed in percentage. Based on the findings, a report was prepared.

BEST PRACTICES OF THE INSTITUTION

Practice -1

Title: Building confidence by learning fluent English

Goals:

In this era of modernization, each and every student should be able to communicate in English as it widely opens the opportunities throughout the world as it has become the global language. The students of our college belong to rural area where English is neglected and they are not able to express themselves in English. Considering all these factors, the Institution has established a well-equipped language laboratory to acquire all the four language skills viz. listening, reading, writing and speaking. The laboratory helps the students to assess their own capacity of fluency and enable then to become a fluent speaker of English language.

In teaching learning process, ICT plays a very important role. It creates the interest among the learners. Student get attracted towards the laboratory as it has the virtual display of videos, grammar lessons, and other necessary language learning items. The principal objective of language laboratory is to enable the students to be fluent speakers of English language and make them confident and self-reliant in English communication.

The Context:

English language laboratory is the prime requirement of the institution. A well-equipped language laboratory needs a huge finance as it comprises a basic infrastructure, computers, head-phones, software and many more things. The institution had already overcome all these issues and hence gave preference to this practice.

The first challenging issue was of the expenditure for the set up. However, by deducting other college expenses, the institution managed to set up the laboratory. The laboratory has 17 computers with headphones and the language software.

The second challenging issue was of the student's compatibility. Student are made computer friendly. It was timely appealed to the students to use the language laboratory daily in their free time as it seemed interesting, students are coming regularly now.

The practice:

English plays a vital role in higher education in India. Importance of English in India is developing day by day. Now, Indian English has become its own brand on International level. It opens the wide job opportunities across the world. In this era of globalization we cannot think without English as it is a connectivity link, library language, language of technology.

The place of English in India has got prime importance. But, teaching learning of English has its own problems. Crowded class rooms and no English atmosphere around the learners make it difficult to acquire the four language learning skills viz. Listening, Reading, Writing and Speaking. In this regard, new innovations and devices are made which role among the learners. Of course, to acquire foreign language is a quite difficult task for the learners. English is taught by following various method and approaches. Audio-visual aids in teaching - learning has its unique features.

Language laboratory creates interests among the learners. Our language lab has computers with updated software which consists of three level of learning Beginner, Intermediate level and Advance level. The students can open their account with the password and access to the course. There are certain audio and videos to be listened and the exercises to be solved. Even grammar and vocabulary explanations are available. Student's log in account can be accessed and assessed by the tutor. Student finds it easy to operate and spend their time in this useful activity. The software also records the pronunciations and answer given to the questions. It improves student's pronunciation. So, this is one of the unique and useful activities of the department.

Each computer has a separate head phone. So, the students can carry on his learning activity without disturbing the co-learners. Students use the language laboratory in their free time. The record of their attendance is kept in register as well as their accounts are displayed on the monitor. The facility to record their exercise is available in the software.

The students are from rural background and they are not aware of computer. It is a small hindrance to run this activity. First of all we instruct the new laboratory users how to use and handle the computers. The working of software and the courses are informed to the new students. There are some challenges in running this activity but, it is necessary for the overall development of the student. It improves their knowledge and communication in English.

Evidence of success:

The demand of linguistic skills is increasing given that learning requirement and command of language are vital in higher education. The student take part in various cocurricular activities such as wall paper presentations, speech competition etc. though the language lab students are able to communicate themselves in various activity. Student participate in speech competition, class seminars etc. Learning a new language just by studying the theory is not enough to guarantee a successful language learning experience. Language lab provides practice in an entertaining and interactive way to acquire the main language skills, listening, speaking reading and writing, students learn more comprehensively through a language lab. Student learns much faster than in a regular class room setting. The language lab boosts the motivation of student's achieving higher levels of language retention and progress. Language lab allows students to practice the language with a much wider variety activities and exercise, based on the computer.

There are many social aspects to learning a language and there are certain aspects can be extremely helpful to study with other people. Language students often use language lab to do independent work such as listening and re-listening to audio recording testing themselves on grammar rules and practicing vocabulary this enable them to make conversational opportunities. Language lab works by providing language learners with software that allows them to do educational tasks such as listen to audio recovery test their vocabulary and learn grammar rules. Traditionally each student is motivated by language lab and is controlled by the tutor. The students are motivated to speak with English speech sounds word accent intonation. We try to improve the fluency in spoken English and neutralize mother tongue influence. We train students to the language appropriately for public speaking and interaction.

Problems encountered and Resources required:

Mostly our students hail from rural areas so they are not aware of modern means of interaction as so we have to take efforts to compete them to know the importance of language lab as the student are weak in grammar so more efforts are taken to motivate them special attention is given to students who are studying grammar and vocabulary various resources like audio video learner is silent who can recognize English language but can't speak learning vocabulary is limited up to 500 words in passive vocabulary. The problems encountered is that they are unable to speak fluently more practice session are to be taken. The students are aware of the fact one is learning language. Various problems are faced during language lab training such as pronunciation, accent, tone for that we try our level best to work hard and give more attention to them so as they are able to cope up with these problems. We give them lessons to recite and pronounce so that they can pronounce properly. The magical concept for any new English learner is system of silent letters like is silent in 'know' and L is silent is 'walk' and Talk it is difficult for many new learner to understand that both writing and speaking patterns are different in English. Many students face the problem with syllable structure and feel confused in stressed and unstressed sounds. In all we try our level best to improve the reading speaking ability of the students through the means of language lab.

Practice - 2

Title: Earn while you learn

Goals:

- (i) To prepare students for successful careers.
- (ii) To help students, who might not be able to study without financial assistance.
- (iii) To enable students to explore their subject preferences and develop them into a career.
- (iv) It aims to help and to exploit the immense potential of students as a valuable human resource.
- (v) It prospers belongingness and encourages involvement of the students in management and development of the College.
- (vi) To inculcate in the students values of hard work and dignity of labour.
- (vii) It helps to channelize the in exhaustive energy of the young students in positive activities.

The Context:

Learn and earn is important in today's increasingly competitive and turbulent work environment, particularly for low-income or under-skilled workers who seek better jobs, a better standard of living, and a potential for career success. Additionally, employers want to recruit qualified candidates but are not finding candidates who are adequately prepared. Both these groups could benefit greatly from learn and earn. Evidence of success:

- (iii)It gives students hands on experience and confidence thereby prepares them better for taking up jobs in future.

Problems encountered and Resources required:
